"Time to Die"

Death is one of those things that most of us really don't want to talk much about. When you are younger, it is easy to assume (often wrongly) that you will have many years ahead to take care of all that dying stuff. Death is something that we don't want to think about, especially when it concerns us or the ones we love. I heard a story one time about three friends who were talking about what they wanted said about them at their funerals. The first said, "I want them to say that I loved my wife and kids well." The second one said, "I want them to say that I was a great philanthropist, always giving to the community." The last guy paused and contemplated a bit, finally he said, "I want them to look into the casket at me and exclaim, 'look he's moving.'" When it comes right down to it, we really don't want to face death. Like the third guy, we sometimes may just find ourselves hoping that we will keep moving and cheat death. But we know better, and Scripture affirms, "it is appointed unto men once to die and after that the judgement" (Heb. 9:27).

I have heard a number of preachers through the years make the statement at a funeral that, "death is a part of life." I emphatically disagree with that statement and also believe that Scripture validates death as the enemy of life and not simply a part of it. Death was never supposed to have raised it's ugly head at all. It is true that death has become a staple at the end of our physical life because of sin, but it is nonetheless the enemy of life from the beginning. Yet, God has used the result of sin, death, as the gateway to eternal life. In fact, when He sent Jesus to the cross to die, He forever conquered death in a way that does indeed offer eternal life to all who believe.

This past week we have enjoyed gathering together people from a number of our churches for our annual Laurens County Revival. Although I must confess that I am always a bit disappointed in the number who choose to participate, those who attended were blessed this year to have Dr. Ron Lynch sharing with us. His ministry is called "Life out of Death Ministry" and very appropriately so. For those who attended, Ron used Scripture to really challenge and reorient our thinking regarding what revival really entails, and what we will have to do to experience it. He not only told us that we should plan for our death, but he told us that if we are a believer, it has already happened. The first night he asked us pointedly, "When did you die?" Not, "when will you die?" Or, "Are you prepared to die?" But, "When did you die?"

You see, the Bible clearly tells us that anyone who has been saved by the blood of Jesus has already died. An oft quoted, but frequently not really pondered verse is, "I am crucified with Christ, nevertheless I live, yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: And the life that I now live in the flesh I live by faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

For every believer, our death has already occurred when Jesus died on the Cross. Ron mentioned that we often talk about the first aspect of the cross in that Christ died for us, but we reflect far less frequently on the second aspect, of our death that we died with Him. Now you may be thinking that while these truths are very important from a theological perspective, they really don't have practical impact on "real" (as in non-spiritual) life. But when we think that way, we would be terribly wrong. You see, when we live the crucified life, we will no longer be engrossed on making sure that people treat us right, or spend so much time fuming over how our reputation has been tarnished, or whether we have enough money to accomplish what we want. Ron reminded us that dead people have "no rights, no reputation, and no resources." Instead, we can live our lives in a way that our "real world" bodies, living in the "real world" serve as a conduit through which the living Christ lives through us! Every part of our body has the opportunity to function through the power of the resurrected Christ in us, as opposed to the sinful life of us.

A death is required in order for a life to be resurrected. Now it may not be palatable for most of us to stop and consider the different aspects of our eventual death, but it is absolutely imperative that Christians significantly ponder the reality of the impact of our death with Christ. Jesus isn't bargaining with us to consider dying with Him, He requires it of all who follow Him. To be unwilling to die, is to be unable to live. The only way that Christ's life can be lived in and through us, is if we choose to die and experienced His resurrected life in us. This is one of the most liberating truths. We know longer have to grit our teeth and try to live the best we can for Christ (because that is impossible, exhausting, and worthless), but I must be willing to die so He can live His life through me. The sooner we realize we can't live for Christ in our own strength, the sooner Christ can begin to live His life through us. But it all starts with our death. So, when did you die?
